Persuasive Texts

Look back at the colour coding that you completed last week, identifying the specific language features of persuasion.

Today we are going to be boxing up a text. Boxing up a text is a way of identifying the different parts so that the structure can clearly be seen. Below you will find an example of when we boxed up a newspaper article we focused on earlier in the year.

Boxing up will provide the basic plan for when you come to create your own persuasive text next week.

Look at the example below of how a boxing up frame has been used to explain basic structure and content and to magpie useful sentence signallers and persuasive phrases.

Now use a ruler and a pencil to box up the Hawk Ridge Farm text. Name each section and label what you think the purpose of each section is.

Last week, we looked at the key language features of this type of text. Now you have looked at several different types of persuasion text can you identify the key structure features? Check in the supporting information section below to see if you were right.

How else could we go about also trying to persuade people to visit an attraction? What about a radio advert?

Can you come up with your own advert to perform to encourage people to come to Hawk Ridge Farm?

Can you come up with any of your own additional phrases that might attract visitors? Think about how to use your voice to make your audience want to visit the farm. Perform your advert to someone at home. Ask them to give you some feedback on the effectiveness of your advert to persuade.

Now, we will start to look at line graphs, which are useful for showing continuous data like time, temperature, height etc.

Look at the line graph in the supporting information section, then answer the questions in the box below.

How is a line graph different to a bar chart?
 What do the x-axis and the y-axis represent in this example?
 What was the temperature at 9am?
 When was the warmest time of the morning?
 How would you estimate the temperature at 9.30am?
 How would you estimate what time it was when the temperature was 7 degrees?
It is important to note that actual readings were taken every hour so the values on the line in between these times are estimates only.



Key structure features

- Makes the intention clear at the beginning and the end
- Logical order
- A series of points building one viewpoint
- Topic sentence in introduction (and in all paragraphs for longer text)
- Often includes images to attract attention

Example of boxing up into sections
